Orphan Adventures: Voices through Time

An exerpt from a booklet detailing the early history of Bethesda Homes

Jesus has commanded His Church to feed His lamb - to care for and nurture the children. Obedient to His command the Church is interested in the welfare of children, especially orphans and children who, because of unfortunate home conditions, do not receive proper physical and spiritual care. To this end children's homes have been established.

Bethesda Homes was the outgrowth of the compassion of Pastor N. S. Haggerness of Mankato, Minnesota, when he opened his home for three children of a broken home. An organizational meeting was held in Lamberton, Minnesota on September 29, 1897, and the Lutheran Orphan Asylum of Lamberton was founded.

After eight years, the Lamberton home had overgrown its purpose and a new home was built near Eagle Lake in Willmar and dedicated on Sunday, November 12, 1905. This new home was built on 163 acres and had room for a farm where they would grow crops and raise animals to help with the growing cost to feed everyone that was served there.

Applications for seniors were soon received and an addition was built to accomodate the growing need for care in the community.

So much of Bethesda's history and future can be credited to the ourpouring support of the community. At one point the homes were hit with a bout of misfortune and they had considered closing them, however God and the community saw differently. At that moment in time, deliveries from the community were made and the trucks were filled with food and clothing for those served at the Bethesda Homes.

<u>Bethesda Fun Fact</u>

In 1905, 163 acres of land were purchased five miles north of Willmar. A new Home was erected that would accomodate 50 children. The name was changed to Bethesda Home and it was dedicated at the Eagle Lake Church on Sunday, November 12, 1905.

Bethesda also welcomed two senior men as residents. During the annual meeting in 1906 it was decided to build a home to serve the senior community, due to considerable debt on the Children's Home building the building was delayed.

At the 1909 annual meeting the matter was revisited and approved with the stipulation that the cost not exceed \$6,000. The new building was ready for occupancy in 1910.

After a few more years more room was needed to accommodate the many applicants. The Board of Directors decided on March 25th of 1915 to build an addition. The new addition was completed in 1916 at a total cost of \$8,230.

During the difficult years of the Great Depression and the drought that accompanied it, Bethesda had a heavy debt of \$23,000. By 1949 the debt had been paid off, and a surplus of approximately \$90,000 had been accumulated. Many improvements had been made on the institution's buildings and on the farm. The favorable turn in finances had partly come about by the sale of farms and other property held by the Homes.

A committee was elected to consider whether it would be advantageous to move Bethesda Home to Willmar, and the committee decided to buy a site in Willmar.
